LTTE in wanni trapping and mistreating civilians: HRW

The LTTE is risking the lives of the Wanni Tamils by subjecting them to forced recruitment, abusive forced labor, and placing restrictions on their movement, Human Rights Watch said in a report released yesterday.

The 17-page report titled -- Trapped and Mistreated: LTTE Abuses against Civilians in the Wanni -- detailed how the LTTE, which had been fighting for an independent Tamil state for 25 years, is brutally abusing the Tamil population in areas under its control.

"The LTTE claims to be fighting for the Tamil people, but it is responsible for much of the suffering of civilians in the Wanni. As the LTTE loses ground to advancing government forces, its treatment of the very people it says it's fighting for is getting worse," HRW Asia Director Brad Adams said

He said that in the face of an ongoing government military offensive, the LTTE has increased the pressure on the civilian population living in areas under its control and by having long used a coercive pass system to prevent civilians from leaving areas it controls, the LTTE has now completely prohibited movement out of the Wanni, except in case of medical emergencies.

"By refusing to allow displaced people to move into government-held territory, the group has severely restricted their access to essential humanitarian relief. Only about a thousand people have managed to flee the conflict zone since March 2008," Mr. Adams said. "By refusing to allow people their basic right to freedom of movement, the LTTE has trapped hundreds of thousands of civilians in a dangerous war zone."

Mr. Adams said the LTTE had a long history of forced recruitment with a dramatic increase in the practice of compelling young men and women, including children, to join its forces.

"The group has recently gone beyond its long-standing 'one person per family' forced recruitment policy in the territory it controls and now sometimes requires two or more family members to join its ranks. Trapped in the LTTE's iron fist, ordinary Tamils are forcibly recruited as fighters and forced to engage in dangerous labor near the front lines," he said.

The HRW report said that while increased international pressure and other factors had led to a decrease in LTTE's recruitment of children, recent reports indicated that the group had stepped up child recruitment in the Wanni.

It said LTTE cadres had urged students between the ages of 14 and 18 to join the group and it often sends 17-year-olds for military training, apparently calculating that by the time such cases are reported to protection agencies, the youths would have turned 18 and no longer could be considered child soldiers.

In the report "Trapped and Mistreated," the HRW called upon the LTTE to allow civilians leave areas under its control; to respect the right to freedom of movement and the right to move to government-controlled territory for safety; Stop all forced recruitment; end all abductions and coercion; end all recruitment of children under the age of 18; cease the use of children in military operations; release all its child combatants including those recruited when children but were now over the age of 18; to stop all abusive or unpaid forced labor, including what it characterizes as 'voluntary'; cease demanding that all families provide labor to the LTTE; stop forcing civilians to engage in labor directly related to the conduct of military operations, such as constructing trenches and bunkers; Provide humanitarian agencies and UN agencies safe and unhindered access to areas under its control, and guarantee the security of all humanitarian and UN workers, including Wanni residents working as humanitarian or UN staff.

Yal Devi travels up to Vavuniya

The Yal Devi train service which terminated at Medawachchiya earlier, will continue to Vavuniya from today, the government information department said.

It said the train service to Vavuniya was suspended in February this year due to threats of terrorist attacks and the resumption was another indication of the success of the government's humanitarian mission in the Wanni.

UN agencies to assist families hit by floods

Severe Damages to LTTE in Confrontations

MULLAITTIVU: LTTE terrorists suffered severe damages in 12 different confrontations in the KUMULAMUNEI area between 10.20am and 6.40pm yesterday (14). Subsequently troops recovered 04 LTTE dead bodies (03 male and 01 female) with 04 T-56 assault rifles and 06 hand grenades in search operations conducted in the area. Police detain 8 Tamil youths in Batticaloa

Sri Lanka Army (SLA) and police, assisted by paramilitary men, arrested eight Tamil youths in a joint cordon and search conducted Sunday night in Kokkaddichchoalai, Batticaloa town, Kaaththaankudi and Ea'raavoor police divisions. More than 900 houses were searched while nearly 4000 persons were interrogated during the operation, police media spokesman said.

The search party, going from house to house, asked for certain persons from a long list of names they had.

The persons asked for are former members of Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) who are now married, leading normal life, residents of the areas said.

All the eight youths arrested are being detained by the police for further interrogation.

3 abducted, teacher reported missing, in Jaffna

Unidentified armed men arriving in a white van abducted three persons including a student from their houses during curfew hours in three separate incidents in Thenmaraadchi, two Friday and the third Saturday, according to complaints lodged with Human Rights Commission (HRC) Jaffna by the abductees' family members. Meanwhile, the wife of a teacher from Vadamaraadchi has reported her husband missing since 8 December with HRC Jaffna office.

The armed men arriving in a white van abducted Ratnam Ranjithakumar, 23, an A/level student, from his house in Va'ra'ni North in Thenmaraadchi, Friday around 11:00 p.m, his parents said in their complaint to HRC.

A labourer from Va'ra'ni North, Ramanathan Sathiyanathan, 25, was abducted from his house at Chimil Amman Koayilady Friday around 11:00 p.m, according to his family members' complaint.

The person abducted Saturday is Rasan Ravinthiran, 36, the father of 2 children and a trader from Meesaalai West, family members of Ravinthiran told HRC.

The teacher reported missing by his wife is Thavarasa Surenthirakumar, 30, from Uchchil Veethi, Karaveddi in Vadamaraadchi.

Surenthirakumar is missing since 8 December after leaving home to Jaffna town.

Three persons being abducted during Sri Lanka Amy (SLA) imposed curfew time in two successive days has caused shock and fear among the residents of Thenmaraadchi.

Unidentified men shoot, injure two sinhala settlers

Two Sinhalese villagers were injured when unidentified men opened fire on a village Samaagipura in Kanthalaai police division in Trincomalee district Saturday night around 7:00 p.m. The villagers were guarding a chena cultivation when they were shot. Sri Lanka Army (SLA) soldiers and police rushed to the site on receipt of information and opened fire in retaliation.

The injured men were admitted to the Kanthalaai general hospital.

More police and SLA soldiers have been deployed to provide security to the village.

Samaagipura is a settlement created following the state aided colonization scheme since the country gained independence.
